Dear Friends,

They had a red background with white lettering, these lapel buttons passed from one person to another when I was a teen. You'd find people putting them on backpacks or purses. Though the pins came in different languages, they all had the same message, "I am Loved."

I Googled the pins, to make sure they weren't a figment of my imagination. I discovered they had existed for much longer than I realized. Barnett Helzberg Junior, of Helzberg Diamonds, proposed to his fiancé in 1967. He wanted to provide everyone with a way to show their love for another, even if it wasn't with a diamond. Barnett then created the "I Am Loved" lapel buttons to pair with the slogan, "Buy her a diamond or give her a button, but in any case, tell her she's loved." That first year they manufactured 50,000 buttons. The buttons were sent across the world by those wanting to share their love. They were gifted to soldiers in Vietnam, patients in hospitals and shared among students. Throughout the many years of that campaign, they made 18 million buttons!

There's a reason those buttons were

so popular and it's not just because people wanted to gift something cheaper than a diamond on Valentine's Day. I wonder, after food and shelter, is the next thing we need for our essential survival love? Perhaps we can live without it, but can we thrive without it? That love can take on different shapes and forms. It can be felt by family, friends, communities, and even strangers.

It often feels difficult to capture the complexities of love. I think of romcoms or Hallmark movies. Love can be reduced down to a holiday or a marketing campaign. The meaning, the action of loving someone, becomes watered down. Even in scripture it can become repeated so often that a reader can feel like they are a skipping record. In just five verses within the fourth chapter of 1 John, the word "love" is said eleven times!

Beloved, let us love one another, because love is from God: everyone who loves is born of God and knows God. (1 John 4:7)

God is love. It is a love that is offensive, radical, and scandalous.

The love that comes from God is sacrificial, merciful, and full of grace. It is not limited to one person, community, tribe, or nation.

As God's people who know God's love, we are implored to share that love with others. We are invited to love with serious consideration given to what love looks like in action. When Paul wrote to the community in Corinth, he was writing to a community in turmoil. A community of people who were fighting over who had the better gifts, who was more important. With this context and not that of a joyful the love hymn of wedding, 1 Corinthians 13 is written. It breaks down what love is and what love is not, especially when things are not all well. "[Love] does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. It does not dishonor others, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered... Love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth."

If we have those buttons on hand and we passed them out, will those who wear them know they are loved by our actions? Will the person who you disagree with, the unhoused, the undocumented immigrant, person of color, the child, the elderly, or the queer teen know they are loved? Will they know God's love because we are patient, kind, advocating for them and wanting the best for them?

There are those in our world who would say empathy is a sin. They believe winning for their own benefit regardless of the cost is all that matters. Those who will put restrictions on God's love and who is worthy of our love. If someone is lifting up hate in the place of love, that is sinful. It is not rooted in the Gospel. To engage in that thinking is to ignore the teachings of Jesus, to miss out on the opportunity of knowing God (1 John 4:8).

"Beloved, since God loved us so much, we also ought to love one another. No one has ever seen God; if we love one another, God abides in us, and his love is perfected in us" (1 John 4:11-12).

Your voice, your actions, your love are needed in this world. Your witness to God's love must be as loud as the voices rooted in fear and hatred. As the old hymn goes, they will know we are Christians by our love. More importantly, they will know God because God's love is perfected in us.



Despite many challenges, **Anderson has always** walked with faith

Since she was a little girl, Muriel Anderson knew that God was with her — even during the darkest times.

The first significant challenge that could have rocked her faith was when her father, a police officer, injured critically while was responding to an emergency call. He was hospitalized on and off for the next year-and-a-half. He was couldn't disabled and Because of the medical bills, her parents couldn't keep up with their house payments. But a Catholic priest helped her father get better in so many ways.

"The priest found that Carmelite Monastery needed a caretaker. The house on the property, which belonged to the nuns, was included. It was in bad repair, but we got it fixed up, moved in, and lived on the grounds. It was a wonderful experience kind of an adventure for all of us. The nuns were so sweet and kind. Being around the nuns you could

feel that God was with you every day," Anderson says.

Another potential faith crisis came after her divorce. But artistic abilities — playing the piano and painting, which she had begun as a child - offered her much-needed solace. Her piano skills even helped sustain her financially after the divorce while she was still caring for the youngest of her four children at home. She found a job at Davenport Bank and then its successor, Quad-City Bank. During that time, she worked there during the day and offered piano lessons during the evening.

"I feel my music and art are gifts from God. I am so grateful," she says, adding that at 81 years young she still plays piano and paints as it helps her feel close to the divine.

Then came a series of health difficulties — a heart attack, openheart surgery, spinal surgery, knee replacement surgery, to name just a few. Each could have taken her off her faith journey, but "with all my recoveries, I have seen God right beside me. He has just always been there," Anderson says.

She joined Grace through the help of her friend, Shirley Jansen "It was about 15 years ago when I was recovering from my first massive heart attack. Shirley, who was raised in the Quaker faith, had bought a home by Grace. She asked if I would like to join her in going to Grace. She was a Quaker, I was a Catholic. We joined Grace and became Lutherans," Anderson says.

She is so grateful for that move. She became involved with the quilting ministry and even donated one of her paintings to a fundraiser for that ministry. "Everyone [at Grace] has been wonderful. It is

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like a family. I feel like I really belong," she says.

Yes, there have been plenty of struggles, but Anderson is quick to say, "It's been a wonderful life. I know that God has been with me every step of the way."


